

From the Rector...

From nightfall and/or midnight on December 24th the season of Christmas begins. It continues until Candlemas or the Presentation of Christ in the Temple on February 2nd. Traditionally, decorations went up on Christmas Eve and came down on Twelfth Night. Unless you are Orthodox when your Christmas is just getting underway as you still use the old Julian calendar. For those of us on the Gregorian calendar we will be commemorating the Epiphany that day. This is the day when non-Jews getting to grips with Jesus as being God incarnate, is celebrated.

For all who live in the northern hemisphere, these are, otherwise, literally dark days. For many around the world they are metaphorically dark days. Then, as now, east and west were fighting over their respective interests in the Middle East. Now, as then, the ordinary people find themselves internally displaced, exiled, giving birth in makeshift maternity wards, denied work, relying on charity, deprived of privacy. Then it was Rome and Persia. Now it is Russia and the United States of America and related protectorates.

As we prepare to meet our maker in what was one of the two occasions in the year when the faithful turned out for Mass, are we looking for a child or a ruler? Here is another of the great openers of the season. What does light in the darkness look like for you? Do you want someone with you, a special someone with you, at your bedside, as you struggle with man flu or something even more serious. Would you rather be assured that an anonymous someone at the top, perhaps literally on the top floor, had a hold on the policies and budgets that meant there will be adequate, rested, personnel and appropriate resources to give you your best possible outcome.


Of course sometimes it is both, and at the same time.

Perhaps, this is yet another of the dizzyingly paradoxical wonders that this Christian tale brings to the season's festive fireside truths. Namely, that this Jesus was, is and will be known by the storytellers as both the answer to their emotional needs and their practical ones. The baby shows a vulnerable God. Like the one in Second Genesis, who loses the creatures they've just made. Yet, the deity also shows the omnipotent child. Like the one who spoke it and it was in Genesis one.

Does this darkness, or do these injustices, overwhelm you or provoke you? Does the image of a child disappoint you or is the icon of an overwhelming spirituality comforting to you? There is a text more often associated with Lent. Preceding the Easter season when we are again presented with a manifest paradox of the celebration of God's death and Jesus' realiving. It reads 'who do you say I am?' Jesus is asking his disciples. He uses God's name as given to Moses 'I am'. In turn, this text asks us who do we think God is? Who do we think Jesus is? Or in other words, are you provoked or overwhelmed? Are you comforted or disappointed.

I hope and pray that as you sing songs and search for a sixpence in your puddings across this Christmas season, alone or in company, that you are supported and inspired. Do stand with God, the church and those that believe in all our brokenness and aspiration as our northern hemisphere world moves from darkness to light. Then and only then will we see the star of wonder rise over the metaphorical darkness, as the songs of messengers of good will are overheard. Then and only then will what has been birthed in you in the world come into being.



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Eco Churches Across the Blyth Valley Churches

Have you heard of Eco Churches?

Across the Blyth Valley Churches we now have six of our 14 churches which have been awarded the A Rocha Eco Church bronze or silver award. This project covers five key areas to support church life, and our dedication to environmental stewardship.

These are:

- · Worship and Teaching
- Land
- Buildings
- · Community and Global Engagement
- Lifestyle

As mentioned on the front page of this month's *BVTimes*, the latest two churches to work on the project - St Andrew's Church in Wissett and St Margaret's Church in Heveningham with Ubbeston - have both received awards.

Part of the funding that was received from the Diocese for children, families and young people's work is going towards supporting the Blyth Valley Churches with our commitment to the Eco Church Project.



Recently, we have developed two bags to support the project, one contains resources for Lichen and the other has some Fungus resources. We also have a digital microscope that can be used to take a closer look at what we find.

The children from Halesworth Day Nursery visited St Mary's Church on Friday 29th November 2024 (see photo) and we had a Lichen workshop.





We looked for and found different types of Lichen in the churchyard, characterising them as leafy, shrub-like or crusty. If you would like to borrow one of the Eco Church bags, please contact Pauline.

Numbers are still low for those who are attending/using the youth space on a Monday night between 6.30pm and 8.30pm and we hope you will help us to continue to spread the word.

At COP29 in November, the UN Secretary General António Guterres described 2024 as "a masterclass in human destruction". The scenes of chaos and misery we have seen in the news this year from around the world – due to flooding, wildfires, heatwaves, droughts and storms – have been deeply distressing, especially since those who are suffering the most, globally, are those who have done the least to create the crisis.

But there is hope! In January 2025, the landmark Climate and Nature Bill will have its Second Reading. This urgent cross-party Bill is backed by almost 200 MPs from all the main parties. Its supporters include Waveney Valley MP, Adrian Ramsay, Bishop of Norwich, Graham Usher (Lead Bishop For the Environment) and Rowan Williams, the former Archbishop of Canterbury.

The Bill has been written by scientists and asks the UK to lock its two, pre-existing international commitments on climate and nature into law. These commitments are: (1) to ensure that the UK stays within its fair share of the remaining global carbon budget for 1.5°C, as agreed at the Paris climate COP in 2015 under David Cameron's premiership (this led to the UK committing to cut emissions 68% on 1990 levels by 2030).

(2) to halt and reverse nature loss by 2030, as agreed at the Montreal biodiversity COP in 2022 when Rishi Sunak was PM. At present we're not on track to meet either of these

commitments and neither our existing legislation nor Government policies match their ambition.

The "CAN" Bill will make these commitments legally binding and ensure the UK does exactly what the science says is necessary to avoid disaster... while also bringing huge benefits for the poorest and most vulnerable in UK society through warmer homes, cheaper energy, better public transport and cleaner air and waterways.

Can you email your MP before their diary fills up to urge them to attend the Second Reading on Friday 24th January? (It is still worth contacting Adrian Ramsay even though he is a supporter.) For it to pass to the next stage, the Bill needs 102 MP's to attend and vote for it.

Why get involved? Jim Green, a Lay Reader with the Blyth Valley Churches, says, 'The Anglican fifth mark of mission is to safeguard the integrity of creation, and one of the sections in the Eco Church scheme involves 'Community and Global Engagement'. Eco Church suggests various ways of taking action, and supporting this Bill would clearly fit in with this. In addition, it may be the last chance of meaningful legislation to make a difference, so if we want to love our local and global neighbour we should get behind this Bill.'

'The Trinity Pilots of Aldeburgh' - Chris Broom

I first came across Trinity House and their pilots when I was researching my husband's ancestors. He descends from three generations of Thames' Pilots, so I was very interested to attend Chris Broom's Talk at the Fromus Centre, Saxmundham on Monday 18th November. Several others in the audience also had ancestral connections with long lines of Pilotage families in Suffolk.

The Talk covered the history of Trinity House as well as its current role. Now Trinity House is responsible for the provision and maintenance of navigational aids, such as lighthouses and buoys. However Trinity House once provided expert navigators (pilots) for ships trading in Northern European waters and in 1808 the Pilotage Act extended their powers to cover all coastal areas of England and Wales.

So why were Pilots needed on the Suffolk coast? Chris explained that the shoals and sand banks close to the English coast were perilous to ships, therefore a pilot was needed to assist with navigation into or from English ports, in order to prevent a shipwreck. A quote from Reverend J Ford clarified that in Aldeburgh, "A great proportion of the seafaring inhabitants are Trinity Pilots who, forming themselves into small associations, purchase swift cutters in which they roam about the great northern ocean, frequently approaching the coast of Norway in search of ships bound to London which need the skillful assistance of an English pilot."

Why Aldeburgh? Aldeburgh was an ideal location for pilots to be based as it had a history of fishing and shipbuilding and was on major shipping routes from Scandinavia to Holland. Chris mentioned and showed images of some of the vessels used by the Aldeburgh pilots to get to the ships such as Yawls, Pilot Cutters and other beach boats.

So how did they know which ships needed assistance? It was very interesting to learn that different flags were hoisted by the ships indicating whether they needed, or already had, a Trinity Pilot

In addition, Lookout Towers were built at Aldeburgh to spot a ship in need. There were two competing Lookout companies of men: the Downtowners who used the North Tower and drank in the Cross Keys, and the Uptowners (South Tower) who drank in the Brudenell Tap. There were about 32 men in each company and if a ship was sighted then pilots would race to provide assistance. One attendee at the Talk said that whichever company got to the ship first threw their hat onto it!

What brought the Aldeburgh pilotage to an end? There were several factors such as new ways to transport goods, steamships and the railway. Navigational aids had improved so experienced pilots were not in such demand but the most significant impact was a Trinity House Decree in 1899 which moved all North Channel pilots to Harwich.

It was very disconcerting to discover that although the courageous Aldeburgh pilots saved many lives, many of them also died at sea. Identification marks such as tattoos were recorded about the pilots in case they drowned at sea!

Some of the Aldeburgh families who were pilots were: Chatten, Dance, Green, Clodd, Thorpe, Flick, Norton, Rust, Filby, Burwood, Catmore, Pallant, Gibson, Norton, Ward & Gibbs

Ernest Edward Gibbs was the last of the Trinity licensed pilots from 1922 - 1946.



From the Ringing Chamber



It is always exciting when a new learner starts on the long journey to become a ringer. Alex lives in Rumburgh but is being taught at Halesworth, because Rumburgh bells are so easy they ring themselves (almost), whereas if you can ring at Halesworth you can ring anywhere. It's early days, but the signs are promising, so watch this space. Joanna, the last person to start the process, has worked really hard over the last year or so and is already working to get her ART (Association of Ringing Teachers) level 3. We could do with a few more recruits though as we are still short of bodies. A word of warning: if you think "that's what I can do when I retire" it will take you twice as long as if you start now, and everyone over the age of 20 that I've ever taught says "I wish I'd done this years ago."

The teaching process is helped these days by the Sole Bay Teaching Hub, an initiative based at Reydon and backed by ART. Learners and teachers come together every Saturday

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



ending to-do list we can finally sit down and celebrate. December was one of the busiest I've known in recent years at St Mary's.



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

Conservation at St Peter's Holton is back

Aurora Consort 'Adventus' Concert on Advent Sunday 1st December 2024 at St Peter's Spexhall

On the First Sunday of Advent the first candle of the wreath is lit as a sign of hope, for the world and for our own lives. To have the honour and pleasure of a concert freely given by the Aurora Consort directed by Vetta Wise was, for St Peter's Spexhall, an occasion for further hope as funds raised will be used for ministry and in maintaining the fabric of the building.

Advent is the time of preparation for the Christmas festival. As well as anticipation it is traditionally a time for personal reflection. The concert opened in that reflective mood with a darkened church, save for the light of candles, as the choir of five voices began with Palestrina's Matin responsory for Advent Sunday (a staple of the Advent Carol Service of King's Cambridge). This was followed by Virgo splendens of the 14th century, music dating from the same century as one doorway of the church, linking us with ancient Spexhall, and the 'hopes and fears' of the many villagers who have worshipped in this space. The choir processed to the chancel to treat us to a lovely collection of a capella carols and seasonal music, which blended the ancient with the new. The familiar Adam lay-y-bounden (Boris Ord), Coventry Carol (arr. Shaw) and the always popular Jesus Christ the Apple Tree (Elizabeth Posten) were among pieces dating from the 14th to the 20th century. There was a wonderful texture of voices, mingling solo parts with beautiful harmonies.

During the concert we were treated to two pieces by composers present with us in church. I sing of a Mayden, a setting of an old English poem by Christopher Upton (singing bass) had perfect harmonies for this choir. Alexander Campkin (who joined us in the audience) composed Bring a torch, Jeanette, Isabella, a setting of a 17th century French poem ending with the two female farm hands finding the baby Jesus. Their excitement of finding the Christ child is tempered by the end of the piece, as the girls are hushed while the baby peacefully sleeps. These remarkable compositions spoke quietly of the wonder of the annunciation and the beauty of the love of Mary for her sleeping son.


Many of us recall *Gaudete* when it was a hit recording by Steeleye Span in 1973. The choir processed from the back of



the church to a drum beat, once more transporting us to the 16th century and the Latin devotions of old. The lovely carols in the second half, together with Alex Campkin's work, led to the glories of Christmas in *Deck the Hall* (arr. Willcocks) and *Ring Christmas Bells* (Leontovich). A "cheeky" *Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer* rounded off the concert with warm applause from a very appreciative audience.

After the candle for hope of the first Sunday in Advent, come the candles for joy, peace and love. The concert programme, so well chosen by Vetta Wise, was a journey through the emotions and longings we experience through Advent, and we thank her and the choir for leading us to the manger and the celebration of that first Christmas morning by shepherds and angels.

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
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
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
