

From the Rector...

Our strap-line is Church in Community and Community in Church. Indeed, that is one of the things that attracted me to applying for the post of Team Rector here in the Blyth Valley.

One of the ways in which I am quite a traditional vicar, is that I see myself as being a public figure: your priest. I would say that, whether you would say you were not religious, pagan, a church goer or only high day and holy days. Just as our Holy Communions are open to all, as Jesus taught at the feeding of the five thousand, so are our churches. They are your buildings whether you say you have a private faith, you use it for mediation, family research or a lunch stop.

However, I am acutely aware that in many respects, I am only a poor wayfaring pilgrim. These churches are only mine whilst I hold Bishop's licence as incumbent for the time I am here. I may love them, be inspired by them, be humbled by them, fed by them, for now, but they are not my parish church. Though it could be said that they really are yours if you and your family have been resident here since Doomsday.

I once worked for the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds promoting the reserves and ideals of a managed coastal defence re-alignment project in Lincolnshire. European money, I think, was secured on the basis that one of two officers would be employed to promote the reserve to be created as part of the programme. That was the partnership's ambition. However, although they offered my line-management, the RSPB's internal policy was not to promote the exact same reserve as it had no facilities. I was caught between a rock and a hard place.

I am really excited by our new administration team - Annie, Carolyn, Pauline, Keith and Richard. I love their ambition to literally and metaphorically signpost all people to our churches. To offer parking, a sacred site, toilets, information, heat and light, merchandise, worship, local products, space, venues, books, clothes swapping, community, advice.

Once again, I am acutely aware that some, if not all, of these

themes may cause a stiffening of our shoulders, a tightening of fists, a sharp intake of breath as some react to their church being spoken of like this. It is perfectly reasonable to picture my church as empty of others. I may want to promote it as my reserved perfect building. That is how I know it. That is how I have loved, cherished and cared for it. I am reminded of the gospel stories of the long -serving labourers in the vineyard and the prodigal son's brother. They were unhappy that latecomers and the unworthy had as much access, as many rights, as they did. 'It is just not fair!' they sulk. 'Who are these people?' we may ask. Accusing that 'they only come for funerals and carols!'

We are caught between a rock and a hard place. So, it seems to me that some of us may have to be honest with ourselves and recognise, as must parents, teachers and coaches, that our child, pupil or trainee may out grow what we can offer. They may end up needing others to support them as they develop beyond our capability. Our child may marry. The pupil move on to secondary school. The trainee may be promoted to another league. In like manner, if we want our churches to survive to speak to future generations, to be loved by them and be their sanctuary, we may have to - in our time - grieve that loss. Perhaps we have to have a grown up conversation and accept that it can be as difficult for the congregation member to welcome, as it is for the visitor to walk through the graveyard and force open the heavy oak door.

I hope that grasping that nettle may help some long-serving, faithful, valiant hearts understand their resistance to efforts to promote visiting and use of their churches. If that soul searching leads to us realising the gear shift it is too much to bear, please understand that it is acceptable to stand down or stand aside. I must say I remain eternally grateful to those stalwarts who have brought us this far. Yet, alongside that I am hugely excited at all that God has in store for us, more than we may ask or imagine, in the year ahead. Thank you all!

Dear Friends.

Since Christmas and New Year passed church life continues with the new school term underway meaning the re-start of Open the Book, Toddlers and Messy Church. We have some new families engaging with us, which is exciting.

We have also had the 'bittersweet' experience of funerals including for two ladies, both of whom had a significant involvement in the life of the church.

The first was Jean Denmark, who died last November, aged 92. She had been well-known in Halesworth, not only at our church and with the Conquest Art Group meeting in our building, but also with the Volunteer Centre, Day Centre, Cameo Group and most of the tea shops and eating places. Even so, having outlived many of her contemporaries, and having been seen much less since moving into a care home in Beccles, the numbers attending were not that high.

Then came Pat Potts, who many of you from all the churches will have known. She was the instigator and most regular staff member of the Sign of the Fish bookshop. Pat had also led the Women's Aglow fellowship in this area, been on the committee of Churches Together and was our Church Secretary for many years. Her death in late December last year was such a shock to many. Pat had a large family, many friends and acquaintances and had been active in the life of the church right up to the end, so we were not surprised to have a packed building to celebrate her life!

I am reminded about the Apostle Paul's comments when writing to the Thessalonians about hope after this life: "We don't want you... to grieve like others who have no hope" (1 Thess 4:13). He goes on to explain the hope we can have for eternity in God's presence by trusting in Jesus Christ. When we celebrate the lives of such faithful disciples of Jesus as Jean and Pat were, yes our sadness and sense of loss are real, but tempered by the knowledge that they are with the Lord.

What has your Team Vicar been up to?

Your Team vicar has mostly been recovering from Christmas which was very special this year. What with nativity plays, carol services (especially the All Access carol service, which is my favourite if I am allowed one!), quiet services and being in church on Christmas Day – I had a very reassuring notion of the

constancy of the Christmas message – God, love on earth, never changing. In the midst of all the trends and gimmicks around Christmas, the challenging news from around the globe and close to home, God's constant and unchanging love is always with us in all of life's ups and downs.

Other than being forced to rest up, I have been preparing for my retirement. Leaving well is always a challenge. When I first took up my post as Team vicar here in April 2022, one of the things I was most happy about was seeing no limit on my time here. Before this I had continuously been moved on every few years — first discernment, then training, then curacy. Then finally — a full-time permanent Team vicar post. I delighted in being able to look ahead, not rush into anything and take my time to see how I might best contribute to the ministry team and the local community.

As one of my favourite Psalms, 127, says "Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labour in vain." Or a more familiar Yiddish saying "We plan, God laughs". I don't think that means God derides our plans, but that God exists at all times and in all places and so would be aware of things coming our way that we haven't a clue about.





We are still mired in the old, Can't shake off the cold It's crept into our very bones, We shut the doors and hibernate at home.


I want to write something hopeful WORDS to cling to, Find a new tune to sing to But January is dark navy blue

The colour of school uniforms, night and deep space Going on forever, Growing blacker, Drifting further.


I need to write something cheery

From the Ringing Chamber



Well, we survived the carol season, by which I mean we produced some pretty decent ringing for seven services in sixteen days, and given that three of those were at Halesworth that's good going for us. Included in the seven were two quarter peals, at Huntingfield and Wissett. Huntingfield bells go quite easily but are difficult to strike well due to the medieval clapper mechanisms (OK, not quite medieval, but 1720s mechanisms were still a bit hit and miss). Anyway, we stuck to the very simple Plain Bob Doubles and rang as well as could reasonably be expected. The same band (plus one) then rang the same thing at Wissett the following day and most of this was excellent.

The monthly quarter peal at Halesworth went quite well, nothing too complicated, Plain Bob again, but notable for the band containing only one visitor. More exciting was the performance, a few days earlier, of a "date touch" at Rumburgh, a piece of ringing comprising 2024 changes, to see out the old year. This took just over an hour, and apart from a little uncertainty at the beginning (some contrivance to achieve the right length which is not divisible by 12) the ringing was almost entirely error-free, until towards the end as tiredness set in and concentration wavered, but this was a good achievement and we felt we had earned our pint in the Buck afterwards.

Alex, our learner, is progressing well and just about managing the frustration that all learners feel when they know what to do and how to do it, but somehow it doesn't quite happen. I'm hopeful we may have another beginner soon – watch this space!

Learners need teachers, and fortunately the Association of Ringing Teachers (ART) runs some excellent one day courses on just how to do that. So it was that eight ringers from the NE District, plus two who had travelled a bit further within Suffolk, came to Reydon one Saturday in January to freeze to death for a few hours while learning how to teach ringing. Hopefully this will in time produce some support for Pete and myself who have shouldered the burden of teaching in recent years.


Sparkles Nursery Become Eco Warriors!

The children from Sparkles Nursery at St Peter's School in Holton, recently joined us in the churchyard of St Peter's Church Holton. The children are becoming the very next Eco Warriors, helping us to not only work towards our Eco Church Award; but learning about God's Creation and the world around us.

This links fantastically with the Early Years Foundation Stage, learning about the world around them, and the EYFS area of Understanding of the World, looking closely at patterns, similarities and differences. As well as other areas of development; such as supporting the communication and language development as they built on their vocabulary to describe the lichen.

We had a wonderful time with the children, who joined us for two Lichen Workshops, one on January 14th and a second group of children on January 16th. It might have been cold weather, but that did not put of these fabulous Eco Warriors. We looked closely at the different patterns on the gravestones of the lichen, and all the different colours we could see. We categorised the lichen by crusty, leafy or shrubby and also by colour. We used different descriptive vocabulary such as powdery, fluffy, speckled and crunchy. We looked carefully at the photos and hunt sheets we had and decided we have a lot of white crusty lichen within Holton churchyard. Pauline, later uploaded our images that we took using the Zorb USB microscope unto the INaturalist website.

We also enjoyed a very lovely game of hide and seek in the

THE HISTORY OF LINSTEAD HAS NOT been without excitement over the years. It is within living memory that the last German aircraft to come down in Suffolk, came down at Grove Farm, Linstead Magna, a few weeks before the war ended. It had launched an attack on Metfield aerodrome, killing a USAAF sergeant, but crashed when it attempted to attack a returning B24 and was too low.



I was always under the impression that it was a lone raider, but the Parish Council has been presented with a tiny piece of the wreckage, together with more historical details.

It appears that the Ju88 had been part of a concerted action, codenamed Operation Gisela. Google has yielded more details: The raid involved over 200 enemy aircraft and they attacked returning allied bombers as they were approaching their home airfields. 20 Allied and three German aircraft were lost. It was the last concerted German night-fighter operation of the war. It is hoped to mount and display this little piece of history. The four German airmen who died were initially interred in Linstead churchyard and a memorial in the church records the fact.

FoSM Lunchtime Recital Review - December 2024

The lunchtime concert at St Mary's Church on Wednesday 18th December was an impressive music recital given by our now familiar singers, Veronica Downing (soprano) and Wendy Slaney (mezzo), with Jonathan Rutherford as accompanist.

This was a recital described by Veronica as "A Christmas stocking of songs", which implies lightweight gifts of a Christmassy flavour. Not so here. Solid classics dominated the first half.

Both the singers were in good voice, taking turns to sing each aria.

Veronica started the recital with Mozart's *Exultate Jubilate*, with its daunting runs. Although she captured every note (no mean feat), I do think that the aria would have been delivered to greater effect had it been placed rather later in the programme. Next came more arias by Mozart, then Handel, Bizet and Schubert.

The second half was lighter. Songs were now sung in English, and included the lesser-known *The Water Mill* by Vaughan Williams, some Gilbert and Sullivan, and some Gershwin. Particularly enjoyable was Wendy's rendering of *Wouldn't it be Loverly* from My Fair Lady, and *The Man I Love* from Lady be Good, sung with a broad accent and beautiful clarity.

The recital was finished off with *Vilja* from The Merry Widow sung by Veronica, sounding a little hesitant, or perhaps tired, and, finally, *Don't cry for me Argentina* from Evita, sung by Wendy.

Jonathan provided a robust and supportive accompaniment on the piano throughout.

The two singers got together to sing *We wish you a Happy Christmas*. It is a shame that there had been no other duets in the recital, for the ladies were well matched vocally. Hopefully, a selection of duets will feature in any future recital of theirs.


