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

From the Rector...

The Archdeacon of Sudbury, David Jenkins, opened a session of June's Diocesan Synod with a list of the three things that drew him to the Church of England. Alongside the medieval buildings, and Betjeman's poems was Choral Evensong. My first experience of Evensong came as a result of realising one of my life time ambitions as an eight year old. That was joining the church choir. Prior to that moment I had merely attended the 9.30am Prayer Book Communion at Holy Trinity, Cookham, first just with my parents and latterly with my sister. Subsequently, a benefit alongside the pocket money we got for singing at weddings, was singing evensong. A particular joy were the seasonal variations that were employed from time to time for Amens and the like replacing the plagal cadences of Ordinary Time. These added delightful extended twiddly bits of a kind otherwise only experienced annually at Christmas when singing Ding Dong Merrily on High!

So what it is evensong exactly? Well, it is pretty much what it says on the tin. Its singing in the evening. More specifically: singing prayers. Back in the day as Christianity grew and developed within and beyond Judaism, the Jewish habit of praying at morning and evening became a habitual norm in believing households across the middle east, Europe and beyond. As groups of families or singles got together in religious houses or communities, they tended to nurture their collective prayer life. Extra prayer times or hours were added, perhaps at the same sort of time as Islamic rhythms of daily prayer became established. The liturgies, or words, used by these collectives then fed back to the wider public in Christian places. In England, Cranmer concatenated vespers (prayers for the evening) and compline (prayers for completion) as used in Sarum (Salisbury Diocese) to create Evensong in his universal Book of Common Prayer that we still use today. It is because it is two services in one that it seems to start and stop twice, with two Lord's Prayers, two sets of canticles and two lessons or Bible readings. It usually also has room for four hymns and or an anthem. In 2000, the Church of England brought out a modern language version which we call Evening Prayer to avoid confusion.

That may not sound like your bag, but I'd recommend you give it a try. Like eating your greens, it'll do you good! I would say that November is an excellent month to dip your toe in the water of Evensong. With the dark and chill of the nights drawing in, we are in the evening of the year. Those long evenings, give us opportunity to remember friends, colleagues and family who have died. Some of us we may be in the evening of our lives and look back to when we were less frail or less frightened. These days one need not be old to be anxious for life as we look at the breakdown of

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international law in the middle east and elsewhere, climate breakdown and ecocide. Restoring the ancient habit of prayer can punctuate a rhythm of life with faith, hope and love. It can mark our progress towards death or remission, or sustain recovery, amidst chaos. The traditional language of evensong adds a transcendent, liminal, timeless, quality to words pregnant with the gravitas of the spirituality of closure.

'Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word, for mine eyes have seen thy salvation...'

All this presents a real ingredient for a good death. Which in itself is a real ingredient for a good life. Incidentally, we are here, like the Pear Tree Centre and our excellent funeral directors in the town, to help you make the spiritual and practical preparations you and your family may need to be considering at this time.

The one draw back of inviting you now is that we have just finished our tour of the parishes which may begin again in March. I continue to read the service with hymns 6pm most Sundays at St Mary's, Halesworth, though. Like our fifth Sunday Holy Communion it is otherwise peripatetic travelling round our outlying parish communities, but on second Sundays. The tour gives an excellent opportunity to invite friends and neighbours to something slightly special. Something that may remind them of days gone by when their own curate and choir would have, no doubt, sung Sunday by Sunday. If you, or someone you know, might be interested in helping us keep the tradition alive do get in touch. Sadly, our excellent Karen is stepping down from coaching our choir, (thank you, you've been great!). We need someone to take it on. It is not robed. There's no membership fee. We do not audition. We borrow and lend our singers to and from a number of other choirs in and around the town. We are not all card carrying churchgoers. What we are is a friendly bunch who share lifts, a love of singing and what we will of the lives we live at other times.

Good evening. And, God bless!

In the URC, as with other denominations, our history has

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
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My travels in Uganda over the years have revealed a spiritual openness, too often coupled with a tendency to look in the wrong places for spiritual experience. And this is reflected to some extent more recently in our culture, with the rise of the 'New Age' movement and the continued interest in mediums

Yet many, even in churches, here in the UK seem not to acknowledge spiritual reality at all - perhaps part of the legacy of "Enlightenment" thinking? The Apostle Paul wrote "About spiritual gifts, I do not want you to be ignorant" (1 Corinthians 12:1) in a section where he goes on to list some of the Gifts of the Spirit. (This is one of four occasions he does so,1 Cor 12: 7-11, then v27-31, Romans 12: 1-11 & Ephesians 4:11-14).

Studying and understanding this teaching, along with the promises Jesus made (especially John 14:15-17, 25-27 & Acts 1:5-8) and the way we see the early church putting this into practice throughout Acts can open us to experience more of what God intends.

Some things will naturally come to a close, some will carry on and grow and new things will be done. We have been in the season of Harvest Festivals where we consider the awesome nature of God's creation, bringing order out of chaos. 

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From the Ringing Chamber

In this column I often talk about quarter peals we have rung, or failed to ring, but what does that mean? I will try and give a flavour of what I'm talking about!

Just as a recap, historically a peal is defined as the number of possible combinations it is possible to get on seven bells, the eighth bell ringing last every time. One starts with rounds, 12345678, the descending scale, and then, on the command "Go....(name of pattern or "method")", at the next stroke the bells start to change their order, following a predetermined pattern. It might start like this:

12345678

21436578

24163758

42617358

46271538

64725138

67452318

In this example of changes on seven bells, the eighth bell, the tenor, is ringing last every time to provide a bit of stability. None of the other bells stay in the same place for more than (at the most) four "blows" and no bell moves more than one

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An independent, small company, based in Halesworth, Reydon and Southwold Any distance travelled place in the sequence at each blow, from which you can see that adjacent pairs swap places each time. With seven bells changing, one bell at least has to stay still each time (because 7 is not divisible by 2 – there are just 3 adjacent pairs. Incidentally that is why changes of seven bells are called "Triples").

The maximum number of possible orders is 7! (7 factorial) or 7x6x5x4x3x2x1 = 5,040. The first "true" peal of 5,040 different orders was rung in Norwich in 1715. "True" means that no order is repeated: before the Norwich landmark 5,040 rows had been rung, but it had subsequently been discovered that the composition used to achieve this was "false", i.e. there had been a repeat of some of the rows, and consequently some rows had been left out.

It is of course impossible for a listener to tell whether there has been a repeated row, so one relies on the integrity of the ringers not to publish a performance that is false. Publish!? Yes, every successful peal, or quarter of a peal, is published on *Bellboard*,

https://bb.ringingworld.co.uk/ which is a great way to find out what your friends have been up to, where and with whom!

A peal takes on average about three hours to complete, and a quarter peal, therefore, about forty-five minutes. It is rare for a peal or quarter to be completed with no mistakes at all, but provided the error is corrected immediately that is deemed to be acceptable. Three hours is a long time to ring non-stop, but forty-five minutes is manageable even for us oldies. Hence we ring quite a few quarter peals ("quarters"). At Wissett recently we were trying to ring a quarter using a pattern ("method") called Netherseale Surprise Minor. "Surprise" is the name given to a category of difficult methods, so quite a challenge. Minor means that six bells were changing places every time. After about 20 minutes there was something of a fracas as people lost concentration, and about a minute later I realised that two bells had swapped places from where they should have been, so called a halt. We'll try again another day.

If you didn't lose a few then the achievement would be purely an endurance issue, and on nice easy bells like Wissett that wouldn't count for much. When we are successful, such as at St Mary's recently, the Bellboard entry looks like this:


HDCF now runs a series of activities each week. It is also developing a Befriending Scheme. These rely very much on volunteers, so if you are able to help, we would love to see you there.

Trustees have been considering ways in which we can be more inclusive and enable more people to join our organisation. The option of being a Friend of Mothers' Union was introduced centrally in 2018 and has been taken up by many dioceses as a new way that people can join Mothers' Union, in addition to that of the traditional MU member.

A Friend of Mothers' Union would be open to everyone, regardless of belief or background, who wants to support the work of Mothers' Union. They would pay the same subscription and receive the Mothers' Union prayer dairy and Connected. A Friend of Mothers' Union however would not be able to stand for an officer role or vote, as these roles are currently for Mothers' Union Members only.

At Council in November a proposal will be presented for approval to adopt the concept of Friend of Mothers' Union here is St Edmundsbury and Ipswich.

Teaching Skills to teenagers. They then shared their ideas with Ann, Geraldine, Alan and Marie, from Blyth Woods. Who intend to incorporate some of the ideas in their final plans for the plot.

It was a real joy to work with the children and to see them so full of enthusiasm for their local natural environment. As the UK faces a Biodiversity Crisis, there was a feeling of hope and optimism about what we can do to help.



HALESWORTH WI

Members listened with interest as Peter explained how the idea for the Air Ambulance came about after the jockey Frankie Dettori's plane crash at Newmarket racecourse. Frankie was flown to hospital in a light airplane getting him to care more quickly.

Following this funds were sought and The East Anglia Air Ambulance service was set up and began flying in 2001 during the day only, in 2013 they included flying at night and in 2021 set up flying 24 hours. There are now two new larger helicopters which provide a smoother ride and can take more equipment. Five helicopters cover all of the east of England, Suffolk, Norfolk, Essex and Cambridgeshire, based at Cambridge, Norwich and Essex they can reach patients, treat them and get them to hospital more quickly. It is like taking a hospital to the patient as they carry

advanced medical equipment, a doctor and a paramedic. The patient will then be flown to the nearest appropriate hospital for their injuries, burns, critical etc. This may not always be the nearest, the 999 centre to take calls is at Chelmsford. The helicopters are rented with fuel and a pilot. They are a 100%charity and rely on donations, coffee mornings, charity runs etc. Their expenses are £500,000 a month. Peter also encouraged us that if witnessing a heart attack to begin heart compressions immediately as the survival rate is very low following an attack and we should all learn how to use a defibrillator.
