

From the Rector...



Regular dog walkers, and folks who make use of the seats on the sunny side of the church whilst eating their fish and chips, among others, will have noticed our sparkly new paths! Thank you to East Suffolk District Council and their high quality contractors for an excellent job on our closed churchyard. The independent charity which is our Parochial Church Council (PCC) tenant the land under the ownership of the Church Commissioners. However, as the churchyard is closed to burials, being full, the district have responsibility for its management.

As with any staged home improvements, the down side with the path work is that it shows up in even more stark relief how much the building itself is in need of some loving care and attention. Back in early 2015, the Eastern Daily Press reported a 'Major project gets underway to enhance and improve Halesworth church'. Since then what you might not have seen is that some significant funds have been raised by the PCC sub-committee called Friends of St Mary's, not least through their acclaimed lunchtime Concert Series. We have had a significant bequest too. What you may have seen, however, is that pews have been removed and chairs generously donated. A temporary floor and carpeting have been installed. This has provided a space that is already being creatively and energetically used by a number of our own and other community initiatives. See how may you can list!

In the last couple of years, earlier plans have been reviewed by the PCC assisted by their sub-committee and a refreshed Steering Group including people from the town and around. Following some really boring engineering, we have discovered – ironically – that the church is built on sand. So, our architect is on the verge of being able to submit a roof, drains, soakaway and repairs proposal to the church's internal planning permission body called the Diocesan Advisory Committee on Churches and Churchyards. These works costing in the region of £250,000, are an essential precursor to any other internal reordering, as the building needs to dry out over three to six years first. We are also pleased to say that the council are going to do some tree work to reduce leaves blocking the drains and allow more sun and air movement to hasten the drying of the building.

Permissions for these internal improvements require a Statement of Significance, setting out the important features that need to be worked around, or dealt with sensitively. This document sits alongside a Statement of Needs, which details the designs and locations of the specific improvements we are seeking. These are glazed doors and a level stone floor incorporating a labyrinth design. Also, toilets and kitchen as at Southwold; heating and lighting as at Beccles, alongside new office space and storage. The Chancel and Lady Chapel will be retained contributing their

significant presence. The organ needs either replacing or a root and branch overhaul. The bells similarly need a £60,000 facelift. Though they punch well above their weight, I should add that this ambition is well beyond our current PCC reserves and personnel.

It is my hope that someone reading this is thinking to themselves why is this taking them all so long. If I were involved it would all have been done and dusted by now! If you said that to me in person I would say how impressed I was with your passion and energy. Evidently, you are just the person we have been waiting for to come forward as either our project manager or fundraiser! Happily, St Mary's, Halesworth, is not the only church in our group offering enthusiasts of all faiths and none the rare opportunity to help look after the living tradition of a building and its money; or organise and authorise events and income, and oil the wheels of community involvement and benefit generally. Do get in touch with me or the relevant Churchwarden if you would like to offer your skills and abilities to make even more of these wonderful resources than the current PCCs are able to pull off. Whilst there are claims circulating that the church is one of the biggest landlords in the land etc, those central funds held by the Church Commissioners are limited to that charity's aims and objectives. These, sadly, do not include provision of revenue for ministry nor capital grants for building improvements. Though there are generous benefactors who may be approached, such as Suffolk Historic Churches and the National Lottery.

On the subject of aims and objectives, I will end with the aims that our Statement of Needs starts with: It is the hope of the PCC, Friends and Steering Group that a re-ordering will re-establish the interior of St Mary's Halesworth as a regionally significant awe-inspiring community hub of heritage. The building will be expected to express spirituality, sanctuary and creativity generally. It will reference the towns brewing history and Blyth Valley location specifically, also incorporating the Hookers with their Kew connection, Lansbury's efforts for social justice and the Buxton anti-slavery campaigns. Please help us help you make this vision a reality, thank you.

Revd Jon Sermon - Minister

Dear Friends,

In some of my preaching, recently, I have been reflecting on the Gifts of the Spirit. And in particular the reality that Jesus wants his church to be equipped for effective mission. Jesus told the first disciples "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses..." (Acts

And alongside gaining a Biblical understanding of how we can be gifted - thus becoming more effective witnesses - we need to understand the necessary balance with the inner work of the Holy Spirit, growing fruit of good character.

In 1 Corinthians 13, Paul brings this out powerfully by 'sandwiching' massive teaching about love between sections on spiritual gifting.

And now we are entering Advent and looking towards Christmas. Our focus turns towards marking, again, the coming of Jesus Christ, making all of this possible.

Through Churches Together, we are pleased to host the Advent tea and worship on Sunday 1st December at 3pm. Please come to our building for this ecumenical celebration.

We have the additional excitement that (along with our sister church at Lowestoft) we are welcoming an ordination student on placement.

Our links with Uganda through Romans 1.11 Trust continue. Here is a photograph from the graduation of students at Wanyange, Jinja during this year's visit.



Plans for the 2025 visit are now underway and I am happy to hear from anyone wishing to explore the possibility of coming with us. The training that Romans 1.11 Trust provide is crucial in an environment of huge church growth with an increasing need for trained Pastors. The men and women on the course are putting into practice the openness to receive gifting from the Holy Spirit to be effective witnesses. But they do need sound Biblical training to put this into context.

With every blessing for a new year filled with love, joy and peace.



half-term; alongside another toy exchange.


We would again like to say thank you to Halesworth Spar for another £20 voucher towards food for this event. It was a perfect end to all of our half-term fun.

Morsbags, the bags that money can't buy, are now making a huge impact in Halesworth, Suffolk. In just a few months we have made and given away 2,500 + Morsbags, and more and more people are spreading our story.

Morsbags are strong, reusable, recycled, unique bags made from textiles otherwise destined for landfill and given away for free to replace plastic bags.

Over 500,000 Morsbags, potentially replacing over 273 million plastic bags, are made by volunteers in nearly 3000 pods in 30 countries, by schools, community payback schemes, students, Guides, in synagogues, churches and mosques, elderly groups, fabulous individuals and even King Charles! They are then given away to shoppers, strangers, food banks, libraries and community centres for FREE.

It's a 'pay it forward', random act of kindness idea and has entirely spread by the labels on the bags and by word of mouth.

Morsbags are so much more sustainable than newly produced 'bags for life' which commonly use new materials such as cotton (pesticide and fertiliser pollution, uses and pollutes huge amounts of water etc) and then are transported across the world.

Morsbags are made locally from material already produced. Across the world 10's of 1000's of people have learnt to sew, made friends and feel part of something positive (this was especially apparent during the pandemic when we had a lot of messages from people struggling with mental health who were grateful to be involved with a creative and positive community). As Morsbags values have grown, the stories have flooded in; of people of all ages learning new skills,

mental health improvement, rehabilitation programmes, bereavement help, dementia help, food banks, of memories jogged due to fabric use, of cake being shared, of hope and fulfilment in communities becoming connected.

Morsbags are based on kindness, creativity and a conviction that we can make a difference - one Morsbag at a time - especially for the whales and sea creatures who mistake plastic bags for lunch.





CHEDISTON CHURCH ORGAN

How good to see the refurbished Copeman Hart organ back in Chediston church. It's an interesting and somewhat lucky story as to how it came to Chediston sometime around the early to mid nineties.

Chediston residents, Jane and the late Tony Parsons, living close to the church, heard that the PCC was looking to replace the existing instrument.

Tony, a brilliant musician as Principal Trombone of the BBC Symphony Orchestra and professor of trombone and Jane, who also worked at the London College of music, discovered that the practise organ in the building was about to be scrapped.

Jane, who had already spoken to the Chairman of the College Corporation, contacted me and explained the situation. Jane said the organ was available for a nominal sum, believed to be £250, but it had to be shifted promptly. I couldn't believe our luck, but obviously I was unable to make a decision without approval from other PCC members. There was also the problem of transport. I frantically contacted as many councillors as I could and was eventually satisfied that I had the backing of everyone. By this time, there were barely twenty four hours left to the deadline and I hadn't a clue as to how to move the organ from central London to rural Suffolk.

I rang Tony in desperation and he came up trumps. He would hire a truck, collect a small party of students to help load and unload and make the delivery, all for the princely sum of £50. I gathered two or three strong volunteers to meet at the war memorial at the appropriate time to manhandle the organ up the path, over a few steps and down the There it stayed until being aisle. carted off for its considerable repairs some months ago. To try and name all the organists who played for services during the intervening years would be futile, but the late Ray Giles was one of the early users. Prior to its timely rescue, the most famous musician to use it was Dr W S Lloyd Webber, father of Julian and Andrew. It was his practise organ as the Director of the college. It was the quick-thinking of Jane and Tony at that time which enabled the organ to be where it is now and hopefully will be enjoyed by many as time goes on.

Are you looking forward to Christmas?

If Christ comes at Christmas for all life, can we use Advent to reflect on how our actions are contributing to the well-being of all life on Earth? Can we think of ways we can be more considerate in caring for God's creation?

With all this in mind I had a look for eco-friendly tips for a green Christmas:



Did you know it's possible to rent a Christmas tree? It goes back afterwards and is replanted in the ground. Whether renting or buying a real tree make sure it's grown sustainably by looking for either the Forest Stewardship

Council (FSC) or Soil Association logo. Or go alternative and use a large branch of holly, or a large perennial indoor plant like a yucca or palm, and decorate it like you would a Christmas tree. If you have a fake tree already then keep on using it as long as possible. If you light up your tree with fairy lights then LEDs use up to 80% less energy than traditional incandescent lights.



Instead of using wrapping paper, much of which has plastic within it, use a scarf to wrap that special present/



Buy recycled, or look for the FSC mark on Christmas cards to guarantee the paper has been produced sustainably and ethically. The Woodland Trust sells cards with also support Britain's woodlands.



Food waste is a huge problem. It's so easy to over-cater at Christmas. Plan to transform left overs into new meals. Freeze what you can't eat. Or donate to a local charity feeding those in need. And compost what is still left.





Almost everything we buy has a carbon footprint and much of it is packaged in un-recyclable plastic. Put simply – by buying

less and buying more sustainably, we can reduce the rate at which natural resources are used up and the earth is polluted. Let's rejoice and take delight in God's free gift to us – God incarnate, a baby born in a manger.


